1.4.2 How the feedback obtained is being analyzed and utilized for overall development of the institution? (maximum 500 words)

The Campus collects the feedback on curriculum aspects and courses and teachers from different stake holders such as students, alumni, parents, periodical analysis is made on student performance, faculty performance, parameters of infrastructure, syllabi, welfare measures to be undertaken etc. The Campus maintains on IQAC s a quality enhancement measure. Under the supervision of Campus authority various cells like career guidance, Anti ragging, sexual harassment cell and different Committees reinforce the guidelines from time to time.

The department initiates structured feedback activity to obtain feedback from internal and external stakeholders, parents, students, employer and teachers. Where in which the feedback is collected on various points analyzed and appropriates actions are taken.

Overall Alumni have suggested that the department should focus on improving communication skills, personality development, Self motivation, Confidence and good mentoring. They also suggested that department should Add some significant papers in the course. According to them library facilities need to be improved by adding some reference book. More internship facilities be made available to students for better teaching capacity exposure. Some special care is also needed for preparing the students for competitive exams such as OTET, CTET, NET, Educational Guidance and career counseling.

As per parents suggestion the students must be involve in the teaching based projects for which more interaction with the students is required. They suggested that examination system is good and they are satisfied about overall academic system. From their point of view mentors interaction with students can be more effective. Use of video lectures for theory must be carried out.

Students felt that library hours should be increased for their self study. They also suggested that the number of library books are not sufficient, on few activities clarity of explanation needed more i.e. psycho

lab experiments, lab manuals are perfectly maintained. For them expert lectures can be arranged for fundamental subjects also.

Feedback from the employer side shows that students teaching skill is good. Potential of the students is appreciable and they have good rating with respect to being to new ideas and learning of new technology.

Teacher's feedback was to introduce new projects and technology based workshop.

### **Utilization**:-

Department has been provided with library facility to access research papers, different workshops and seminars are organized, special interests given to the students, conducting various competitions and tests of knowledge, ethics and communications etc..

Department strengthening their staffs through counseling and they are motivated for using the ICT in classroom.

This practice may be traced back to ancient Gurukulasdeveloped during the period of Vashishtha, Sandipani and Kanva. Most of the Sanskrit Universities and colleges are rigorously

following this tradition. If the Shastras are protected, then its credit goes to thiese incredible Indian *Guru* - *ShishyaParampara* only. In all over India, there are so many living Gurukulas where students are learning Shastras from very early age. There are Sanskrit Pathashaalas where the students are getting admissions at early age to study different Shastras traditionally from eighth class. All these *Gurukula's* and *Pathashaala*'s are in fact feeders of our Sanskrit institutions for Higher Education.

For the benefit of the teachers, we are strictly following the U.G.C. norms of Career Advancement Scheme. We have adopted an institution friendly and pro teacher approach to administration for which we are interacting with the faculties of different departments and trying to solve their problems at our level. Apart from this, we have formed different Committees for good governance and better interaction and our achievement in this direction is quite spectacular. We have to create many mile stones in the path of progress to promote Sanskrit which is considered as the hidden treasure buried under heaps of rubbish.

The syllabus and curriculum designed by this University are mainly based on Sanskrit learning and job oriented. The Campus is facing a lot of problems as there is less number of supporting Teaching & Non-Teaching Staff to run the administrative office as well as teaching Departments. As result of which teaching and office works affected the normal academic growth of the campus.

Large no. of buildings have been constructed in the campus financial assistance from the MHRD. A multi purpose Hall, Admin block, 2 block are a bare necessity. For its maintenance, repair and renovation no maintenance wing has yet been established. The University being situated near by sea shore, the buildings suffer deterioration due to saline climate which needs immediate and timely repair and maintenance. The University is six kms. away from the District Head quarter Hospital, Puri. Where as no free medical facilities in near by areas are available.
